

Alignment to the 2030 AGENDA for sustainable development



Our objectives are aligned with the United Nations (UN) *Agenda 2023*, mainly with *Sustainable Development Goal 3: Health and well-being (SDG 3)* and its targets:

3.2 End preventable deaths of newborns and children under 5 years of age, with all countries aiming to reduce neonatal mortality to at least as low as 12 per 1,000 live births and under-5 mortality to at least as low as 25 per 1,000 live births.

With the attention of early childhood, providing free medical consultation, vitamins for disease prevention, and medicines free of charge. In addition to prenatal consultations to promote proper perinatal health.

3.3 End the epidemics of AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria and neglected tropical diseases and combat hepatitis, water-borne diseases and other communicable diseases:

3.7 Ensure universal access to sexual and reproductive health-care services, including for family planning, information and education, and the integration of reproductive health into national strategies and programmes

3.7.1 "...women of reproductive age (aged 15-49 years) who have their need for family planning satisfied with modern methods"

With our interventions in sexual and reproductive education, and by providing family planning methods free of charge..

3.8 Achieve universal health coverage, including financial risk protection, access to quality essential health-care services and access to safe, effective, quality and affordable essential medicines and vaccines for all

Through our brigades we offer high quality health services, providing free medicines and vaccines according to the needs of each person.

3.9 Substantially reduce the number of deaths and illnesses from hazardous chemicals and air, water and soil pollution and contamination.

3.9.2 ".... unsafe water, unsafe sanitation and lack of hygiene (exposure to unsafe Water, Sanitation and Hygiene for All (WASH) services)"

In each intervention, information on the source of the water consumed and its treatment is recorded, allowing the detection of possible health risks and the issuance of recommendations to reduce them.

3.b "...provide access to affordable essential medicines and vaccines"

By providing free medicines and vaccinations that complete the basic vaccination schedule and are adapted to the clinical context of each person.

It is important to remember that all **SDGs** are interrelated, and our actions have strong linkages to other goals and targets:

SDG2 End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture.

Target 2.2 By 2030, end all forms of malnutrition, including achieving, by 2025, the internationally agreed targets on stunting and wasting in children under 5 years of age, and address the nutritional needs of adolescent girls, pregnant and lactating women and older persons.

Our nutrition service helps to adapt the resources available in the communities to achieve a sufficient and balanced diet, in addition we provide different nutritional supplements appropriate to the age and clinical context of the people.

SDG4 Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all.

Target 4.7 Ensure that all learners acquire the knowledge and skills needed to promote sustainable development

Through our Education area, we offer refresher courses in the health area taught by trained professionals, at an affordable cost and aimed at a wide variety of audiences.

SDG5 Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls

Target 5.6 "Ensure universal access to sexual and reproductive health and reproductive rights..."

5.6.1 "Proportion of women aged 15-49 years who make their own informed decisions regarding sexual relations, contraceptive use and reproductive health care"

With our interventions in sexual and reproductive education, and providing family planning methods free of charge, in addition to prenatal control consultations offered to people during any phase of their pregnancy. **SDG10** Reduce inequality within and among countries

Target 10.2 By 2030, empower and promote the social, economic and political inclusion of all, irrespective of age, sex, disability, race, ethnicity, origin, religion or economic or other status





MULTIDISCIPLINARY HEALTH FIELD CLINICS ONE IN SITUATIONS OF EXTREME MARGINALIZA-TION, DIFFICULT ACCESS, OR DISASTER

a) To provide primary and specialized medical care to communities of extreme marginalization, difficult access, and vulnerable populations or in extreme situations.

b) To offer these communities comprehensive health services such as nutrition, psychology, physical rehabilitation, and dentistry.

c) Provide Access to diagnostic aids to support medical decisions, such as rapid screening tests for HIV, Hepatitis C, Syphilis, and Dengue, electrocardiogram, ultrasound, spirometry, blood chemistry, prostate antigen,

d) To provide medications free of charge, after the consultation in accordance with medical findings.

e) Humanitarian medical care, distribution of medicines and supplies, and execution of search and rescue field operations during disaster situations.

f) Perform screenings for diseases that represent a risk for key populations and neglected tropical diseases.

PREVENTION CAMPAIGNS

a) Selective implementation of specific prevention campaigns focused mainly on: i. Neglected or stigmatized tropical diseases. ii. Sexual, reproductive and women's health. iii. Non-communicable diseases and mental health. iv. Chronic degenerative diseases. v. Emergencias sanitarias.

HEALTH PROMOTION ADVOCACY AND ALIGNMENT WITH GLOBAL AGENDA



1. Multidisciplinary Health Field Clinics

In 2024, Medical IMPACT grew – and so did its achievements:

4,500 (1) general medicine consultations

1,436 physical therapy consultations



779 nutrition consultations



104 W fluoride applications

19,232 different medicines and vitamins were provided free of charge

*Including: rapid screening tests for HIV, Hepatitis C, Syphilis and Dengue, electrocardiograms, ultrasounds, spirometry, glucometry, blood chemistries, prostate antigen tests, bone densitometry and cervical cytology.



International Impact

This past year, thanks to the various alliances we have made, we were able to have an impact outside of Mexico.

In **Sierra Leone**, an estimated 2,258 people were impacted. In Colombia, a total of 1,364 services were provided, including 92 rapid tests for the detection of STIs, 252 people vaccinated, 24 psychological care, 22 people who received family planning counseling, and more in 6 multidisciplinary health clinics in the field.



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Dispatch protocol

Medical IMPACT has a multidisciplinary team in charge of being activated in emergency cases. In 2024, constant interventions continued in the areas mainly affected by the passage of Hurricane Otis in Guerrero at the end of 2023 in order to support the recovery of the affected people; later, actions had to continue in these locations due to the passage of Hurricane John towards the end of 2024. This protocol was also activated on 2 more occasions, one in Chalco, State of Mexico, due to flooding caused by heavy rains; and in Quintana Roo after the passage of Hurricane Beryl.

During the activation in response to this protocol, we deployed field operation clinics made up of different health care stations. These are integrated by:




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Health outreach clinics

Through monthly outreach field clinics, health services were brought to underserved communities in the Valley of Mexico that do not have easy access to medical care or other essential resources, with the goal of helping to reduce the gaps in access to health care in Mexico and improve people's quality of life.

During these clinics, the following stations were set up to provide care to the populations:









60 field clinics were deployed in the metropolitan area during 2024, providing a total of 10,327 health care services:

Dewormed people

In response to Mexico's lag in the prevention of infectious gastrointestinal diseases, especially in hard-to-reach and rural areas, a series of preventive actions have been carried out. These include:



Use of audiovisual material for the identification of risk factors, signs and symptoms of parasitosis and different alternatives for its prevention;



Distribution of sufficient and adequate doses of medication for all the people who attend the deworming campaign and for their families;




Health education at the time of delivery of the medication 3) with the objective of explaining how to take the medication, the importance and frequency of deworming, and to resolve any doubts that may arise on the part of the beneficiaries.

Thanks to the effort maintained throughout the year, and the collaboration with multiple allies, in 2024 we benefited 9 states of the Mexican Republic with 6,898 doses of vaccines applied, which were distributed as follows:

Project: Ve por ellas

Focused on promoting the sexual and reproductive health of women and people with gestational capacity living in the communities where we have access. In 2024 we provided tools through health education for decision making in relation to their family planning interests and made available to people a subdermal contraceptive implant preloaded in a disposable applicator, always preceded by a complete medical consultation to corroborate the viability of this method for each person.

Project: Salud sexual y reproductiva para todes

Through sex education available in all our brigades and the implementation of a specific module for this purpose and for the application of rapid tests for the detection of STI's, we seek to enable the population to make informed decisions regarding their sexuality and to obtain freedom and autonomy, exercising their sexual rights.

During this year 2024 we reached **370 people impacted** by means of **sexual education** alone, as well as the application of rapid detection tests (which are accompanied by personalized sexual education) with the following distribution:



In addition to these actions, two fixed field clinics were opened to provide care to key populations, located in the Tabacalera neighborhood of the Cuauhtémoc delegation, where all the services available during our brigades are offered, providing dignified and respectful care to key populations such as the LGBT+ community, sex workers and migrant populations.



Bone Clinic+ Bone and metabolic health screening for people living with HIV

In order to raise awareness among the population living with HIV about the importance of health care, screening was offered: for bone density, through the application of calcaneal bone densitometry; to identify metabolic disorders, renal and hepatic lesions, blood chemistries were performed, all situations associated with the prolonged use of antiretroviral therapy. In addition to the above, medical counseling was provided to all users who received screening tests.


During 6 months, we offered these services in the metropolitan area of Mexico City and the State of Mexico, thanks to the support of CAPASITS in the State of Mexico and allied organizations in Mexico City.



The Health Advocacy area at Medical IMPACT specializes in promoting advocacy on public health issues through science diplomacy. Its mission is to translate scientific evidence into concrete actions that promote health policies based on data and oriented to the common good.

It stands out for its ability to build strategic alliances with organizations, groups and associations, which strengthens its reach and legitimacy. These collaborations are key to broadening the impact on the discussion of priority public health issues.

The Health Advocacy area has a strong presence at the local, national, regional and international levels, which allows it to address health challenges from a comprehensive and multisectoral perspective. Its experience is reflected in the organization of legislative forums, commemorative events in government buildings and spaces for dialogue that position health as a central issue on the public agenda.

Through these initiatives, the Health Advocacy area connects the scientific community with decision makers, promoting an inclusive and informative dialogue with a global vision, always with the objective of improving people's quality of life.


We reached **1,666** people through the **"Education and Art"** initiative, where children, in particular, were able to enjoy moments of learning and connection.



As a special request from the National Women's Institute (INMUJERES) of the state government of Guerrero, we gave the:

5. VOLUNTEERING AND CITIZEN PARTICIPATION Volunteer program for healthcare professionals

An invaluable part of the success of a field clinic that seeks to create a favorable impact in the communities are the volunteers who lend their time, knowledge, effort and dedication so that the people who come to the field clinic receive the best possible care and the hope that we seek to leave in each of our interventions.

This is why our volunteer program seeks to grow stronger every year. In 2024, 78 people participates in our volunteering program for health professionals and the general public.

Health and nutrition

With the support of Slow food, Red de banco de alimentos, Alimento para todos, Colectivo Alfa, Manos amigues, Inclusivo quien lo lea, and Corporativo Apple México we carried out Disco sopa, a collaborative cooking activity of rescued food to raise awareness and fight against food waste. It took place on Sunday, May 26, at the community kitchen "Manos Amigues" located at Pedro Moreno #113-Local A, colonia Guerrero, Cuauhtémoc, Mexico City.



One Health is a comprehensive approach that recognizes the interconnection between human health, animal health and environmental health. It aims to design and implement public health policies, research and actions that consider these three pillars to prevent diseases, ensure food security and face threats such as climate change and pandemics. This approach is key in the fight against zoonotic diseases (such as COVID-19 or avian influenza), antimicrobial resistance and other global health problems, which makes the Sustainable Development Goal of Health and Well-being closely related and interconnected with the other SDGs.

Limpiemos Xochimilco

Thanks to the collaboration with "Ruta del Ajolote" and the support of volunteers from DHL, on Saturday, October 26, 2024, the volunteer activity "Limpiemos Xochimilco" was carried out, which consisted in the collection of water lilies in the canals of Xochimilco, which is considered an invasive species because it does not belong to the ecosystem of the locality and alters the ecological balance of the area. This invasive plant interferes with the harmonious development of the native flora and fauna of the area, as well as with the transportation of the communities, their economic activities and even their food source.





Johnson & Johnson Global **Pro-Bono 2024**

As part of its pro-bono volunteer program, Medical IMPACT participated in the "Data System" Management & Training" project, in which we received 3 international volunteers from the United States, Chile and Switzerland. They worked for 3 weeks to strengthen the Data Management area, improving the processes of data collection, storage and analysis. In addition, they were integrated into the operational activities of the organization by supporting a brigade to learn first-hand the circuit of a field intervention. They also participated in talks with Medical IMPACT's decision makers so that the proposals and documents generated could be put into action within the organization.

Restauracion de Xochimilco

In conjunction with Ruta del ajolote, Pyxera Global and Johnson & Johnson, a team of 25 volunteers took part in the restoration of a Chinampa in Xochimilco, which is an ancestral and efficient method of agriculture that also forms a complex ecosystem with great effects on the climate and air quality of Mexico City. The objective of this action was to create an environment conducive to the development of the hummingbird, one of the main pollinators of the region and whose lack of natural habitat puts its survival at risk, thus contributing to the improvement of air quality by recovering the ancestral chinampa and at the same time promoting the restoration of hummingbirds as the main pollinators of the area, helping the rest of the crops in the region.





PWC's ScopeAthon

As part of PWC's support program for Civil Society Organizations, PWC participated in the "ScopeAthon" event in which a large group of volunteers helped produce a complete "Scoping" roadmap" to identify common problems and generate proposals for possible solutions. The process, divided into two sections, 1) Understanding and defining a challenge, 2) Building a proposed process to address the challenge, took place in April. From this event, the Medical IMPACT team received training to improve processes and support them through the use of AI as a tool.

Citizen Participation

Diverse health for colored bodies

A gathering of sexual dissidences to celebrate quality of life and wellness in community where people were invited to participate in various physical and cultural activities, workshops and talks to raise awareness of collective diversity and promote health within the community. The event provided various spaces to share ideas and interact in a festive and safe environment, in addition to offering rapid detection tests for STI's and promoting sexual health.





Cathy Barrow. United for Guerrero: Music for Reconstruction

A concert with a cause whose proceeds went to support the people affected by Hurricane Otis, in the framework of its anniversary. In this great event the famous violinist Cathy Barrow delighted the audience with a special selection for this solemn date while a collection of photographs taken during the various brigades in Coyuca de Benitez, a community affected by the meteorological event, were projected.

INSTITUTIONAL **STRENGTHENING**

This year was one of great growth for Medical IMPACT and this brings with it the responsibility and the need to achieve institutional strengthening so that help can reach more people. It is thanks to the collaboration of all the institutions from all sectors, allies, benefactors, social service providers and cooperation networks that we have been able to reach our objectives and it is because of them that this achievement can be accomplished.

With the ultimate goal of providing greater transparency and reliability in 2024 we passed the CASE accreditation and remain part of the PYMO Marketplace.

CASE (Compliance and Sustainability Evaluation) is the certification that PYMO grants to organizations that have demonstrated compliance with Mexican regulations, impact with a specific project, have clear and transparent finances that reduce the investment risk for donors, and have a solid internal structure and a good service model.

7.1 Monitoring, Evaluation, and Data Management

The creation of the area of Monitoring, Evaluation and Data Management in 2024 allowed us to improve accountability, impact measurement, the recounting of the results of our various activities and to become an organization that creates scientific knowledge.

From this area, we began the digitalization of several processes to move towards greater operational and administrative efficiency. The collection of medical information in several of our services is now done electronically, allowing better monitoring and data collection in the field, which allows us to better understand the populations served and make better decisions in order to achieve the greatest benefit for the impacted communities.

With the use of satellite internet acquired this year, we are now able to maintain communications even in geographic areas that do not have conventional telecommunications. This increases the safety of our team and optimizes our collection of epidemiological information in the communities visited, being especially favorable in disaster situations in which communications are interrupted and most of the health services are not available, so we have valuable information for the planning and execution of support plans in these circumstances.




